At the moment we have a number of practicum students in our school. KW, 1/2G, 3/4T and 5/6R all have second year students on their class. KH has a final



#### **Public Speaking Competition**

#### **Learning Disposition Wheel**

Our school is constantly referring to the Learning Disposition Wheel. This wheel has been created after much research by educators and determines the necessary qualities everyone requires to be a successful learner as well as having a healthy well-being. The area of 'focus' from the wheel is one identified by our staff that many students struggle to maintain and regulate.





It is important to make the distinction between compliance and focus. Focus is referring to one's ability to have self-control and confidence. At home students can work on improving their focus by participating in activities like:

- Building activities for example, with your child have a set of playing cards each and see who can build the higher house of cards before they fall.
- 3D memory games
- Puzzle games rubik cube and snake cubes
- Board games
- Cooking baking with your child helps them focus longer by following recipes

In general, hands on activities that foster thinking at the same time are most beneficial in improving focus. Whilst students can show great focus when using technology, it is important to avoid excessive screen time at home and encourage your child to explore more hands-on activities.

#### **Semester One Reports**

Semester One reports will be sent home with every student tomorrow. This will provide the opportunity to discuss your child's progress with them before three way conferences commence next week. Please remember to book a time if you haven't already done so. The ability to book a time closes tomorrow. An exclusive talk from two former residents, Elizabeth and Alec from Greta migrant camp. Some information has also been included from 'My Memoirs' by Irene Brent who was another former resident.

"I was born in the camp" says Elizabeth "But I heard from my mother and others who came on the boat that it was a horrible experience to come by boat. There were around 50 babies and children dying per ship and there were many diseases spreading through the boats. In her book about her life, 'My Memoirs', Irene Brent "I came on the plane from Hungary. It was a converted Lancaster Bomber from the war and it was un-insulated and freezing. While we were flying some staff came around and offered us tea."
